Patrick H. Byrne is a Professor in the Department of Philosophy at Boston College (Chestnut Hill MA 02467), where he has taught since 1975. He received his Ph.D. from the State University of New York at Stony Brook. As his areas of special philosophical interest he lists philosophy of science, ethics, science and religion, Bernard Lonergan, and Aristotle. He is co-editor of *Method: Journal of Lonergan Studies* and a board member of the Lilly Fellows Program. In addition to authoring the monographs *The Ethics of Discernment: Lonergan's Foundations for Ethics* (2016) and *Analysis and Science in Aristotle* (1997), he has published articles in *Oxford Bibliographies in Literary and Critical Theory*, *Journal of the British Society for Phenomenology*, *American Catholic Philosophical Quarterly*, *Lonergan Workshop*, *Divyadaan: Journal of Philosophy and Education*, *Theological Studies*, and *Worldviews: Environment, Culture, Religion*.

David Carreon, M.D., is a psychiatrist who trained at Stanford University. Over the past five years, Dr. Carreon has conducted research at Stanford in the Etkin Neuroscience Lab, primarily focusing on the underlying physiology of psychiatric disorders. He has been practicing since 2014 and has clinical experience with TMS and other neuro-modulation techniques.

Dimitrios Dentsoras is an Assistant Professor in Philosophy at the University of Manitoba (Winnipeg, MB, R3T 2M8), where he teaches ancient philosophy and ethics.
