**Peter A. French** is the Lincoln Chair in Ethics and the Director of the Lincoln Center for Applied Ethics at Arizona State University, Formerly, he held the Cole Chair in Ethics at the University of South Florida and before that he was the Lennox Distinguished Professor of the Humanities and Professor of Philosophy at Trinity University in San Antonio, Texas.
