From the Editor





Dedication to Lori Fells, 1962-2003

This issue of *Questions: Philosophy for Young People* is dedicated to the memory of Lori Fells, a member of our editorial board and Associate Director at the Philosophy Documentation Center, our publisher. Lori was responsible for virtually all of the work for the layout and design of *Questions*. She died on May 7, 2003, at age 40, after a difficult and courageous struggle with brain cancer.
